

VBA 2024 Legislative Report Week 4

BOTTLE BILL OVERRIDE

On Tuesday, the Senate failed to override the Governor's veto of <u>H.158</u>, a bill that would have expanded the bottle redemption system. The Governor vetoed the bill last summer after it passed the House and Senate. You can read his veto message <u>here</u>. It's unlikely that any new changes to the bottle redemption system will be considered again during Governor Scott's tenure.

DLL DTC REPORT

This week, the DLL released a <u>report on a direct-to-consumer shipping compliance</u> survey. The report's conclusions were stark:

Based on the results of this pilot program, DLL concludes that lawful Direct to Consumer (DTC) shipping in Vermont is significantly underregulated and would take a significant investment to properly regulate and ensure public safety.

The fact that only half of the products received were shipped by a licensed entity is problematic. And of those licensed entities, only 20% reported their shipment to DLL. The pilot program revealed that common carriers are generally compliant with state training requirements (60% of the time) and compliant at obtaining signatures at the time of delivery (88% of the time). DLL also found that shippers generally comply by marking shipments as "containing alcohol" (85% of the time).

In terms of public safety, the Department is concerned that in both instances of a minor receiving the alcohol beverage shipment, the product was delivered without asking for identification. In fact, Identification was only asked of the recipient 20% of the time. As a comparison, DLL sees a 85%-90% compliance rate for sales to minors at brick-and-mortar establishments.

Alcohol sales via DTC shipping is difficult to regulate. The cost of a comprehensive program would be extremely expensive for any widespread application. The Department does not currently have the resources to regulate the currently licensed activity.

It's not yet clear what, if any, steps the legislature will take to respond to the results of the DLL survey. We will keep you posted.

MISCELLANEOUS ALCOHOL BILL

On Wednesday last week the <u>House Government Operation committee</u> began consideration of alcohol issues that may be included in a miscellaneous tax bill.

The committee first heard an <u>update</u> from Wendy Knight, Commissioner of DLL. Next, the committee heard from the sponsors of the following bills:

- <u>H. 643</u> An act relating to the sale of closed containers of alcoholic beverages within a first- or third-class license serving area. Under current law, establishments that have both a first (and/or third) and second-class license, must have a segregated space for each license at a single establishment. This bill would remove the segregated space requirement and allow both (or all three) licenses to operate in a contiguous space within an establishment.
- H. 680 An act relating to expanding access to special venue serving permits. Under current law, a special venue serving permit may be granted to an art gallery, bookstore, public library or museum after receiving approval from the local control commission and paying a fee. A special venue serving permit authorizes the holder to serve beer, wine or RTDs, purchased directly from a retailer. The bill would replace the word "bookstore" with "retail establishment" thereby expanding the types of retailers that can access this type of permit.
- H. 662 An act relating to the merger of entities that hold separate alcoholic beverage licenses. This bill would allow two or more licensed entities that have merged and formed a parent corporation to continue to hold separate alcoholic beverage licenses while operating under a unified payroll and administrative system. This bill came from Eden Cider Co. They purchased Shelburne Vineyard and created a holding company that owns 100% of both Eden and Shelburne Vineyard. When they merged the two companies, they were stymied by a provision in statute that requires personnel to be employees of the licensee. They want to have all employees on the same payroll and still maintain separate licensed facilities. They went to DLL and requested a waiver but DLL couldn't grant it because it's a statutory issue.

The committee seemed open to each of these proposals. The VBA GAC reviewed each of these bills and did not find any of them to be objectionable. The VBA has requested an opportunity to meet the committee to review the craft beer industry and outline policy priorities. We expect that hearing to be the week of February 5th.
