MALT BEVERAGE TAX INCREASE DISCUSSIONS

Several economic factors are forcing lawmakers to look under every couch cushion for spare change. Some of the factors driving Vermont's current budget crunch include: the end of Federal COVID relief funds, increasing education costs driven in part by deteriorating infrastructure and increased student mental health needs, increasing health insurance costs for public employees, increasing rates of homelessness and substance use disorder, and on-going public safety challenges. In light of these challenges, it is not surprising that lawmakers are looking at all revenue options, including a possible change to alcohol taxes.

To be very clear, **there is not currently a proposal on the table**, just discussions, mostly "in the hallway." Rep. Birong, Vice Chair of the House Government Operations and Military Affairs Committee and committee lead on DLL issues, is considering proposing an "ABV equivalency" reform to alcohol taxes. There is not currently a model of this kind of alcohol taxation in other states. Very roughly, such a proposal could increase beer taxes by \$.15 - \$.20 per gallon. Any alcohol tax proposal would be considered by the House Ways and Means Committee and would not likely be included in the miscellaneous alcohol bill.

The VBA Government Affairs Committee is not waiting for a proposal to emerge to prepare for this conversation. Last Friday, the committee met with representatives from the BA to enlist their support. We will stay in close contact with the BA as this conversation evolves.

MISCELLANEOUS ALCOHOL BILL

Last week, the House Government Operations and Military Affairs Committee took more testimony on the proposed <u>miscellaneous alcohol bill</u>. The committee heard from several public health advocates on the dangers of over-consumption of alcohol, and how government regulation can reduce or exacerbate over-consumption. That testimony can be reviewed <u>here</u>, <u>here</u>, and <u>here</u>. Each of the witnesses expressed concern with Sections 1 & 2 in the miscellaneous alcohol bill that would remove the segregated space requirement for Class 1/3 and Class 2 licenses and allow both (or all three) licenses to operate in a contiguous space within an establishment. Like DLL, these witnesses warned against the dangers of increased outlet density that could result from this proposal.

The committee is <u>scheduled</u> to continue consideration of the bill on Wednesday and Thursday afternoon next week.
