

VBA Legislative Update – Week 6 February 15, 2025

Business Leaders Call on Lawmakers to Reject Efforts to Divert Payroll Tax Away from Childcare

The Governor's FY26 budget proposes to take \$20m from the proceeds of the child care pay roll tax and use it for purposes unrelated to childcare. This week <u>a powerful group of business leaders</u> from around the state called on lawmakers to reject the Governor's proposal and to instead use the payroll tax proceeds for their intended purposes. The leaders noted the many gains that have been made since the passage of Act 76, Vermont's historic comprehensive child care law, and urged lawmakers to stay the course in order to fully realize the goals of the law.

The House Appropriations Committee is working through the Governor's proposed budget and should have a proposal ready for consideration by the full House by the end of March.

Hearing to Consider whether to repeal the scheduled sunset on to-go drinks.

On Wednesday afternoon, <u>House Government Operations and Military Affairs</u> will be considering draft legislation regarding the scheduled repeal of the pandemic-era law authorizing to-go drinks (<u>7 VSA §230</u>).

Under current law, first- and third-class licensees may sell malt beverages, vinous beverages, and spirits-based prepared drinks for off-premises consumption when accompanied by a food order and when otherwise in compliance with the provisions of <u>7 VSA §230</u>. The law was enacted during the pandemic and is scheduled to sunset on July 1, 2025.
